Dear Members,

This is my last newsletter because my term as President of MIHS ended at the Annual Business Meeting on March 26. This year we tried something new. Instead of the usual technical lecture, we invited Past-Presidents to reflect back on their careers and describe a time or situation that was most significant in their work life.

Although my term as President of MIHS was very challenging and sometimes very frustrating, it was also a very enjoyable experience. ## Past President's Breakfast Meeting

On Tuesday, March 26th, 2002 approximately twenty members of the Michigan Industrial Hygiene Society attended its Annual Past President's Breakfast and Business Meeting at the Laurel Park Holiday Inn in Livonia, Michigan. Nearly nine past presidents attended to hear brief presentations from several speakers regarding a historical perspective on the contributions of the Industrial Hygiene profession to the modern workplace.

The speakers included Mr. Roger L. Wabeke, MIHS Past-President 1979-80; Mr. Doug Dely of Mania Interactive and Dr. Henry Lick, MIHS Past-President 1987-88 and currently President of the American Industrial Hygiene Association. The speakers provided perspectives on Industrial Hygiene from the Past, Opportunities to communicate in the Present and look into what challenges and opportunities lie ahead for Industrial Hygiene.

The first speaker, Mr. Roger L. Wabeke MIHS Past-President for 1979-80, reviewed an illustrative case study reminding all present of the value provided by professional Industrial Hygienist's recognition of workplace factors and stresses which impact the safety and productivity of employees in the workplace. Mr. Doug Dely of Mania Interactive provided a guided tour of the new MIHSWeb.ORG website for the Michigan Industrial Hygiene Society. **WWW.MIHSWEB.ORG**, I wanted to take this opportunity to encourage each member to acquaint themselves with the features of this valuable resource. Some of the most notable features of the MIHS website are:

**Event Calendar** - A list of the upcoming meetings and events of interest to MIHS members will be maintained here. Members will be able to click on the "Register" link to send email reservation to the programs committee chairperson to confirm their attendance at these important functions. Future web site enhancements may allow members to request download of the history of their attendance at local section functions. This information would be of assistance to members maintaining documentation for the continuance of their professional certifications.

**MIHS Newsletters** - An archive of the Michigan Industrial Hygiene Society quarterly newsletters will be available for downloading in adobe acrobat PDF format.

**Directory of Officers and Board Members** - Information regarding the current board members and the President, Past-President, President-Elect, Treasurer and Secretary is readily available from this section of our website. The phone number, facsimile number, and email link is provided for both the MIHS and the Western Michigan Industrial Hygiene Associations. Also available from this section is a list of the past MIHS officers.

**Local Section By-Laws** - The bylaws for our section is easily reviewable by both members and professionals interested in our organization's operating guidelines.

**Member Listing** - Non-members will be able to verify or review the list of the names and company affiliations of our members.

Members can request changes or corrections to this information using email links found on each directory page. Future web site developments will allow members to actually correct their data online.

**Membership Enrollment** - This section of the website provide information on becoming a member of MIHS. Interested individuals can complete the form online and print it on their local printers. The form and payment can then be sent to the MIHS official postal box for consideration by the board. Future website enhancements may allow online registration and credit card payment of dues for prospective members.

**Membership Bulletin Board** - Future enhancements to our site will include a bulletin board or "Chat" page. This section of the site will allow broadcast messages to be responded to by members. Exchange of members' comments, suggestions and concerns will be greatly increased by this feature.

**Membership Feedback** - An email link is provided from all of our webpages. Our members are encouraged to comment or respond to any information posted on the site.

Future Enhancements to our site may include online dues payment using a secured credit card web page. In the future a dynamic database of membership data may allow members to alter their membership data online, eliminating the delays associated with email submissions of membership changes.
